<u>Debussy's Vocal Music and Its Poetic</u>
<u>Evocations</u> by Siglind Bruhn, edited by

In fin-de-siècle Paris, composers encountered an artistic atmosphere that was crucially determined by a number of poets who met regularly in the famous cabaret "Le Chat Noir" and at Stéphane Mallarmé's Tuesday soirées. According to Paul Dukas, these poets conceived their texts like musicians or painters: "Verlaine, Mallarmé, and Laforgue presented us with new tones, new sounds. They projected lights onto their words as had never been seen before," thus developing an aesthetics that Charles Baudelaire had termed "la correspondance des arts."

Claude Debussy (1862-1918), an avid reader of contemporary poetry, became a member of these circles when still in his early twenties. While as a student at the Paris conservatoire he had primarily set texts by poets from the generation of his parents and grandparents, he now turned to the lyric

works of his contemporaries. The vocal cycles he composed in the course of the 30 years between 1885 and 1915 trace the path of his compositional development, which particularly since his encounter with the poetry of Paul Verlaine was defined by the quest for liberation from conventions handed down for too long.

**Debussy's Vocal Music and Its Poetic Evocations**, the first of two intended complements to Images and Ideas in Modern French Piano Music, offers background information, analyses, and interpretations of his seminal cycles for voice and piano – Ariettes oubliées (1885-1887), Cina poèmes de Charles Baudelaire (1887-1889), Trois mélodies de Verlaine (1891), Fêtes galantes I & II (1891-1892/1904), Proses lyriques (1892-1893), Trois chansons de Bilitis (1897-1898), Trois ballades de François Villon (1910), and Trois poèmes de Stéphane Mallarmé (1913) – complemented by the cantata La damoiselle élue (1887-1888) and Debussy's only completed opera, Pelléas et Mélisande (1902).

Author Siglind Bruhn was born in Hamburg, studied piano performance and comparative literature and philosophy before earning a doctorate at the University of Vienna in music analysis / musical hermeneutics. After years of teaching in Germany and at the University of Hong Kong, she has been since 1993 a Life Research Associate at the University of Michigan's Institute for the Humanities.

Bruhn's research in Debussy's Vocal Music and Its Poetic Evocations focuses

on concert and operatic music of the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> centuries, particularly in its relationship to literature, the fine arts, and religion. In addition to numerous essays and articles, Siglind has published more than 25 book-length monographs and five anthologies.

Not included are the numerous individual songs, the twelve works for soloist(s) and/or choir with orchestra, and the four a cappella pieces. Other compositions in which Debussy was significantly inspired by poetry without however entrusting the words to a voice are the piano pieces "Claire de lune" from the Suite bergamasque and nos. 1/4, 1/8, and 11/2 of the Preludes, addressed in Images and Ideas, as well as several works reserved for a study on Debussy's instrumental music to be published next year.

<u>Sketchbook</u>: An Imaginative Illustration

Journal illustrated by Katie Vernon
(Quarry Books)

Sketchbook series offers page after page of beautiful inspiration designed to get aspiring artists drawing, coloring, and creating their own personal works of art. Stickers and partially illustrated pages provide a canvas to encourage them to practice drawing various themes and elements. Each illustrated

spread is followed by a prompt with the same theme, ready for readers to fill in with their own designs and stickers.

Black and white drawings with touches of color get them started and invite further experimentation. The uncoated paper stock is perfect for drawing, painting, and coloring with any variety of materials. The included stickers are printed on soft uncoated paper so they can take color or additional drawing on top.

Author/illustrator Katie Vernon is an illustrator who has spent most of her life in the Midwest but whose heart belongs in the mountains. She is a master watercolorist, and winner of the 2015 Lilla Rogers Global Talent Search. Her inspiration comes from being a florist, working with alpacas, and living on a bus.

With <u>Draw, Color, and Sticker Nature</u>
<u>Sketchbook</u>, artists warm up with coloring pages, each of which is followed by a partial illustration in a similar theme, ready to be finished by them. They then draw in their own details, embellish with coordinated stickers, and finally add color. Themes such as prairie flowers, butterflies, and nature mandalas inspire readers to take their art skills to the next level.

   The designs featured in <u>Draw, Color, and</u>
   <u>Sticker Nature Sketchbook</u> are set up in

pairs. The first two pages contain a full drawing, ready to color. Readers color with crayons, colored pencils, colored markers, or even with watercolors. If they are feeling adventurous, they can draw in a few extra details with a permanent marker, and embellish with stickers before they color. The second two pages in the pair contain a partial drawing with a similar design. They can look at the finished drawings from the previous spread for inspiration, or doodle from their own imagination.

Readers can feel free to draw using any tools and colors that appeal to them. Each design theme has a coordinated sticker page in the back of the book. The last two sticker pages are extras that can be used anywhere. They can use the coordinated stickers, or mix and match throughout the book to create unique designs in their own vision.

<u>Sketchbook</u> is a simple, yet beautiful creative outlet for anyone learning to draw. They follow the prompts as they draw, color, and sticker their way through the sketchbook. <>

Straw Bale Building Details: An Illustrated Guide for Design and Construction by CASBA (California Straw Building Association) (New Society Publishers)

As we are all too aware, the world is facing many challenges. These include global climate change, economic inequality, homelessness and a lack of

affordable housing, and a general longing for a greater sense of community.

While straw building cannot by itself solve all of these problems, remarkably, it offers solutions that have the potential to address each of them. As a highly insulating material, straw can help create housing that is comfortable, affordable, safe, and ecological for a large number of people – in California, the US, and worldwide. The thick walls are beautiful. They are also strong and fire resistant; this has been proven by earthquake testing, rebuilding efforts in Pakistan and Nepal, and the survival of several homes after devastating wildfires in the western US.

Straw bale buildings promise superior insulation and flexibility across a range of design aesthetics, while using a typically local and abundant lowembodied energy material that sequesters carbon – an important part of mitigating climate change. However, some early straw bale designs and construction methods resulted in buildings that failed to meet design goals for energy efficiency and durability. This led to improved building practices and a deeper understanding of the building science underlying this building system.

Distilling two decades of site-built straw bale design and construction experience, **Straw Bale Building Details** is an illustrated guide that covers:

- Principles and process of straw bale design and building, options, and alternatives.
- Building science of straw bale wall systems.
- How design impacts cost, building efficiency, and durability.
- Avoiding costly mistakes and increasing construction efficiency.
- Dozens of time-tested detailed drawings for straw bale wall assemblies, including foundations, windows and doors, and roofs.

Everyday Chaos: Technology, Complexity, and How We're Thriving in a New World of Possibility by David Weinberger (Harvard Business Review Press)

From the earliest days of the World Wide Web, David Weinberger has been a pioneering thought leader about the Internet's effect on people's lives, on their businesses, and most of all, on their ideas. He has contributed to fields ranging from marketing to libraries to politics to journalism and more as a strategic marketing VP and consultant; an Internet adviser to presidential campaigns; an early social-networking entrepreneur; a writer-in-residence at Google; a senior researcher at Harvard's Berkman Klein Center for Internet & Society, a fellow at Harvard's Shorenstein Center on Media, Politics and Public Policy, and a Franklin Fellow at the US State Department.

<u>Italian Food</u> by Elizabeth David (Grub Street)

Basil was no more than the name of bachelor uncles, courgette was printed in italics as an alien word, and few of us knew how to eat spaghetti or pick a globe artichoke to pieces.... Then came Elizabeth David like sunshine, writing with brief elegance about good food, that is, about food well contrived, well cooked. She made us understand that we could do better with what we had. – Jane Grigson

Originally published in 1954, the importance of Italian Food, which required a full year's research in Italy, can only be appreciated when people realize that Elizabeth David was working in a post-rationing England which regarded Italian cuisine as nothing more than variations on pasta and veal. What she discovered was an enormous wealth of regional diversity in ingredients, methods, and even language, where the same pasta shape can be called three or four names in different parts of the country. She understood that all Italian cooking is regional; there is no 'national' cuisine and so there are eight recipes for aubergines (eggplant), fourteen for artichokes, five for fennel and seven for lentils, all from different regions. But if such descriptions seem to today's readers overly thorough it is because many of her 1950's audience would have never heard of risotto, gorgonzola, prosciutto or even olive oil, let alone been able to purchase them. **Italian Food** is a critical and analytical look at Italian food – David's personality

and point of view come out on almost every page – organized by type of dish rather than by region – and is full of details of kitchens and cooking by painters from the 14th, 15th and 18th centuries. The book is filled with asides and quotes from Italian writers and thinkers and as confirmation that this is more a work of scholarship than a simple book on cooking, there are appendices of bibliographies and notes on wine.

David (1913-1992) lived and kept house in France, Italy, Greece, Egypt and India, learning the local dishes and cooking them in her own kitchens. She found not only the practical side but also the literature of cookery of absorbing interest. Her first book, Mediterranean Food, appeared in 1950. In 1951 French Country Cooking was published and in 1954, after a year of research in Italy, **Italian Food**. This was followed by Summer Cooking (1955), French Provincial Cooking (1960) and Spices, Salt and Aromatics in the English Kitchen (1970). In 1973 she concentrated on study and experiment for English Bread and Yeast Cookery, for which she won the 1977 Glenfiddich Writer of the Year Award. Honorary doctorates were conferred on her by the universities of Essex and Bristol, In 1982 she was elected Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature. She died on 22 May 1992.

Hot, Cold, Heavy, Light collects 100 writings – some long, some short – that taken together form a group portrait of many of the world's most significant and interesting artists. From Pablo Picasso to Cindy Sherman, Old Masters to contemporary masters, paintings to comix, and saints to charlatans, Peter Schjeldahl ranges widely through the diverse and confusing art world, an expert guide to a dazzling scene.

Schjeldahl has been the art critic for the New Yorker since 1998. Prior to that he wrote art criticism for 7 Days and the Village Voice. Among his many honors is the 2008 Clark Prize for Excellence in Arts Writing.

Schjeldahl's reviews are more essay than criticism, and he offers engaging and informative accounts of artists and their work. For more than three decades, he has written about art with Emersonian openness and clarity. Children are spending less time being outside in nature, playing, imagining, and learning about their surroundings. Instead, they are spending more time with tablets, televisions, and overly structured routines. Preschool beyond Walls shows practical and strategic ways educators can create rich, explorative, and interdisciplinary learning through extensive outdoor experiences.

Educators learn how to develop and implement a nature-based curriculum to support children's optimal learning, from start to finish. Whether they are creating a new curriculum or transitioning from a traditional approach, they learn how to:

- Create a program philosophy.
- Infuse nature into all aspects of their program.
- Prepare teachers for a naturecentered approach.
- Implement curriculum and pedagogy that emphasize inquiry-based learning through play and hands-on discovery.
- Maintain high-quality early childhood practices that support children's development.

Author Rachel Larimore worked for 15 years as director of education at the Chippewa Nature Center in Midland, Michigan.

According to Claire Warden in the foreword to <u>Preschool beyond Walls</u>, this comprehensive book, written by an experienced, deeply reflective colleague, supports educators in increasing the profile of the natural world in their early childhood setting. It

creates a thought-provoking journey not only for people who are new to the field, but also for those who have been in this field for some time.

According to <u>Preschool beyond Walls</u>, children need experiences in nature for their physical, cognitive, socialemotional, and spiritual health.

Reciprocally, the natural world needs children to protect and care for it. These seem like lofty statements, but there is mounting evidence that both are undeniably true.

The great news is there are many parents and educators throughout the world vowing to do better for young children – to reverse the trend of children's disconnect from nature. One such effort is the integration of nature into early childhood education, particularly through the implementation of nature-based preschools (NBPs). These schools have the dual goals of educating children in developmentally appropriate ways and fostering environmentally sustainable behavior.

Hopefully, as educators read <u>Preschool</u> <u>beyond Walls</u>, the possible small changes in practice will become evident. Perhaps readers will start by adding more natural elements indoors, shift to starting their day outside in the natural play area, or hire someone to provide a workshop for the staff about the nature-based approach. It does not matter where they begin, just that they begin. So Larimore advises readers to identify the underlying philosophy, their desired vision, and gaps between their

current practice and their vision; establish measurable goals to achieving the vision; and then get to work in changing the practice. This is the essence of being an intentional teacher and administrator.

There are chapters in <u>Preschool beyond</u> <u>Walls</u> focused on the teacher and families, but there is no chapter focused on the child. The reason for this is quite simple: Children are primed and ready for learning outdoors. From the child's perspective, it's really simple – let's go outside and play. Adults, on the other hand, have had a lifetime to worry, analyze, and create worst-case scenarios in their heads. In other words, if programs are going to be more nature-based, the energy is most likely going to be focused on changing the adults' attitudes and behaviors.

Preschool beyond Walls focuses on helping early childhood professionals, administrators and teachers alike, to change practices to more fully integrate nature into their programs. Larimore believes that any program can increase its integration of nature and reap the benefits. This book provides these teachers and administrators with real, tangible ideas for integrating nature into preschool programs that are already in operation.

To accomplish this goal, <u>Preschool</u> <u>beyond Walls</u> starts broad and then narrows as it goes. It starts by discussing the overall theory and philosophy behind NBPs. Then it moves into discussing the pedagogy in more detail,

including structuring the physical environment. Finally, it pulls everything together in terms of daily planning and working with families. Each chapter includes background information, tangible examples of those concepts in action, answers to frequently asked questions, and "Reflections on Practice" prompts to encourage readers to think about their current practice and opportunities to move toward a nature-based approach.

Part I starts by creating a clear foundation to raise awareness and understanding of nature-based preschools. These chapters examine the philosophical and pedagogical values that drive and guide the practice in these settings and the impact those values have on operational aspects. This section of Preschool beyond Walls also acknowledges that the natural world increases the complexity of spaces, and various sections discuss risk management and hazard minimization.

The whole of part II explores the three classroom areas of inside, outside, and beyond. Each space has a unique way of shaping the relationship between the child and the environment. Larimore guides readers through the steps required to create nature-based spaces that explore opportunities for all the developmental domains.

Collaboration – between teachers and children, between members of teaching teams, and between teachers and families – supports the connection between children's experiences at

school and their leisure time. It is fitting that Larimore places this section last, as she practices her belief that educators need to set both children and families up for success in nature-based preschools.

Rachel's voice comes clearly through this wonderful book, which gave me a sense of being with her on the journey to increase the time our youngest children spend in the natural world. I thoroughly recommend this book to you and hope you enjoy reading it as much as I have. – Claire Warden

Out of Our Minds: What We Think and How We Came to Think It by Felipe Fernández-Armesto (Oneworld Publications)

To imagine – to see that which is not there – is the startling ability that has fuelled human development and innovation through the centuries. As a species we stand alone in our remarkable capacity to refashion the world after the pictures in our minds.

Traversing the realms of science, politics, religion, culture, philosophy and history, Felipe Fernández-Armesto in <u>Out of Our Minds</u> reveals the thrilling and disquieting tales of human's imaginative leaps – from the first Homo sapiens to the present day.

Fernández-Armesto is an award-winning British historian and the author of several bestselling books, including 1492, Ideas that Changed the World and The Americas. He is a professor of history at the University of Notre Dame.

Through groundbreaking insights in cognitive science, he explores how and why we have ideas in the first place, providing a tantalizing glimpse into who we are and what we might yet accomplish. Fernández-Armesto shows that bad ideas are often more influential than good ones; that the oldest recoverable thoughts include some of the best; that ideas of Western origin often issued from exchanges with the wider world; and that the pace of innovative thinking is under threat.

To understand the present and unlock possible futures, we need true accounts of what we think and of how and why we think it: the cognitive processes that trigger the reimaginings we call ideas; the individuals, schools, traditions, and networks that transmit them; the external influences from culture and nature that color, condition, and tweak them. <u>Out of Our Minds</u> is an attempt to provide such an account. It is not

meant to be comprehensive. It deals only with ideas from the past that are still around today, forming and informing the world, making and misleading it. By `ideas' he says he means thoughts that are products of imagination exceeding experience and excelling mere anticipation. They are different from ordinary thoughts not only because they are new but because they involve seeing what has never before been seen. Those covered in Out of Our Minds may take the form of visions or inspiration, but are different from mental `trips' – incoherent transports or ecstasies – or mental music (unless or until words are set to it) because they constitute models for changing the world.

Instead of following the usual routine and relying only on written records, Fernández-Armesto starts the story in deep layers of evidence, reconstructing thoughts of our Palaeolithic ancestors and even, in the limited degree the sources permit, reaching for ideas that came out of the minds of cognate or preceding species of hominids and hominids. Among revelations that will surprise most readers are: the antiquity of much of the toolkit of ideas on which we rely; the subtlety and profundity of the thinking of early Homo sapiens; and how little we have added to the stock of ideas we inherited from the remote past.

He departs from the convention of writing the history of ideas as if it were a parade of the thoughts of individual thinkers. He says he cannot avoid mentioning Confucius and Christ, Einstein and Epicurus, Darwin and Diogenes. But in <u>Out of Our Minds</u>, the disembodied ideas are the heroes and the villains.

The story matches the matrix of history in general, as ideas, like cultures, multiply and diverge, pullulate and perish, exchange and reconverge, without ever – in any sustained fashion – progressing or developing or evolving, or gaining in simplicity or complexity, or fitting any other formula.

In the early phases of the story, all the ideas we know about seem to be the common property of humankind, carried, unforgotten, from a single culture of origin over time and across migrants' changing environments. Increasingly, however, for reasons Fernández-Armesto tries to explore, some regions and some cultures demonstrate peculiar inventiveness. The focus of **Out of Our Minds** therefore narrows, first to privileged parts of Eurasia, later to the West. Toward the end of the book, other parts of the world figure mainly as receptors of ideas most of which originate in Europe and North America.

Even in the long passages that focus on the West, <u>Out of Our Minds</u> is not primarily about Western ideas but about those that, wherever they originated, have spread so widely as to become fully intelligible, for good and ill, only as part of the intellectual heritage of humankind.

<u>Suffragettes</u> by Lauren Willmott (**Images** of The National Archives Series: Pen & Sword History)

2018 was the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first women's vote in Britain. That was the year of the publication of **Suffragettes** in England. Now the book is being released in North America and distributed by Casemate IPM.

1918 was a watershed moment for the development of British democracy: for the first time some women could vote. The occasion marked the culmination of a fifty-year long, arduous struggle of thousands of women and men up and down the country.

Using unique documents and images held at The National Archives,

Suffragettes delves into the world of suffrage and traces the journey of thousands of individuals, fighting to achieve women's rights in a man's world, and how they were ultimately able to emerge largely victorious.

Author Lauren Willmott spent four years at The National Archives as a records specialist. She has an active interest in gender history, and particularly the changing role of women in British society from the Victorian era to the Second World War. She now works as a curator in a major museum.

On 20 June 1837, Princess Alexandrina Victoria was pronounced Queen Victoria of Britain. With an annual income of £385,000 and an Empire that soon encompassed one-fifth of the world's population, she became the richest and most powerful woman not only in Britain, but in the world.

Elsewhere in Britain, married women were not even able to own property, let alone an Empire, nor were respectable women expected to work. A woman's place, as dictated by the patriarchal ruling of Victorian Britain, was in the home, nurturing a family. Respectable men, on the other hand, were the `breadwinners', the providers and protectors of the family. Despite the young Queen heading the government, she was considered a temporary anomaly; with her male advisors, male MPs and male Prime Minister – as voted for by a small number of men – politics remained very much a man's world.

Yet, as told in **Suffragettes**, some women were not content to remain in these distinct and prescribed spheres. One by one, the restrictions imposed on them were gradually challenged. In 1859, the Society for Promoting Women's Employment was established, followed by the Married Women's Property Committee. The Ladies' National Association for the Repeal of the Contagious Diseases Act was founded, led by Josephine Butler. The Association campaigned to overturn the double standards of the Contagious Diseases Act of 1864, which aimed to check venereal disease in the army by arresting and examining prostitutes only. It took twenty years of campaigning

before the act was finally repealed in 1886.

Perhaps, though, the most iconic element of this emerging Victorian feminism was the struggle for the vote. The first claim for women's votes came in response to the expansion of male suffrage in 1867 for more working-class men than ever before. If they can vote, some women began to ask, why can't we? John Stuart Mill's bold suggestion to change 'man' to 'person' in amendments to the Reform Act was thoroughly quashed by an overwhelming majority of MPs. This setback, however, did not deter Lydia Becker, Millicent Fawcett and hundreds of others, who were about to embark upon a fifty-year arduous journey to transform women's lives. To do this, they demanded the vote, a say in the political arena to enable moral, social and cultural improvements for women. With this, women's suffragism was born.

Throughout **Suffragettes**, Willmott delves into the world of suffrage. Using documents and images from The National Archives, she traces this journey and gains a unique insight into the trials, tribulations and turmoil of the suffrage struggle. The story of the Pankhursts' headstrong leadership and the dramatic Derby Day death of Emily Wilding Davison has become embedded in popular consciousness, but the story of suffragism is much bigger than a few fervent militants. **Suffragettes** follows the story of thousands of individual women (and men), in dozens of organizations across

the nation, each of whom contributed to the long fight against patriarchal rule and oppression – and how they were ultimately able to emerge victorious.

Documents from The National Archives are rare and historic, and photos and drawings help tell the story of **Suffragettes**. <>

FDR at War (Boxed Set): The Mantle of Command, Commander in Chief, and War and Peace, 3 volumes by Nigel Hamilton (Houghton Mifflin Harcourt)

FDR at War (Boxed Set) is the definitive three-volume history that FDR did not live to write: the story of World War II from his perspective, showing his mastery of strategy, his vision, and how he overcame resistance from Churchill and his own generals to set the course for victory. <u>Climate and Society</u>, Transforming the Future, 1st edition by Robin Leichenko & Karen O'Brien (Polity Press)

This important new book presents current and emerging thinking on the social dimensions of climate change. Using powerful examples, <u>Climate and Society</u> introduces key concepts and frameworks for understanding the multifaceted connections between climate and society.

Authors Robin Leichenko and Karen O'Brien frame climate change as a social issue that calls for integrative approaches to research, policy, and action. They explore dominant and relevant discourses on the social drivers and impacts of climate change, highlighting the important roles that worldviews and beliefs play in shaping responses to climate challenges. Situating climate change within the context of a rapidly changing world, **Climate and Society** demonstrates how dynamic political, economic, and environmental contexts amplify risks yet also present opportunities for transformative responses.

Leichenko is Professor of Geography at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. O'Brien is Professor in the Department of Sociology and Human Geography at the University of Oslo.

Along with increasing awareness of the reality of climate change, there is growing recognition that the sooner people take action, the lower the risks of severe, widespread, and irreversible global impacts. But how should people

respond? What can they do? Answering these questions begins with seeing climate change as more than an environmental issue. People need to look more broadly at social, economic, political, and cultural processes that are both driving climate change and influencing responses. They also need to look more deeply at how they see themselves in the world, how they relate to others, and how individual and collective decisions and actions are shaping the future for generations to come.

**Climate and Society** explores social causes, consequences, and responses to climate change. The point of departure is that there are many different perspectives on the problem of climate change and many different approaches to solutions. According to Leichenko and O'Brien, when climate change is viewed as an environmental problem, the solutions are usually technical or behavioral, such as managing greenhouse gas emissions and promoting environmentally friendly lifestyles. When climate change is viewed as a social problem, the solutions expand to include economic, political, cultural, and institutional changes, some with the potential for transforming society in ways that address multiple global challenges, including poverty and inequality, food insecurity, biodiversity loss, and health crises. The United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for 2030 recognize that all of these global issues are linked, including SDG Goal 13: "Take

urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts".

Climate and Society presents an integrative framing of climate change, exploring the many lenses through which one can view the issue and its social dimensions. The book helps readers think about climate change in new and different ways, to see not only the problems but also the possibilities and potentials for transformative responses. Some of the key messages that emerge as readers read this book:

- Science is not enough to stimulate action on climate change. Chapter 2 discusses how climate science provides overwhelming evidence that humans are causing climate change.
- Discourses have power. Different ways of defining, describing, and discussing the problem of climate change lead to different solutions. Chapter 3 presents some of the key discourses related to climate change and describe the types of responses that they prioritize.
- Worldviews shape perspectives.
   Chapter 4 explores how worldviews represent the lenses through which people understand reality; like discourses, they are shaped by social processes, institutions, and relations, as well as by everyday experiences.
- Greenhouse gas emissions and energy use are driven by social processes. Chapters 5 and 6 show that the rising emissions from the production and consumption of fossil fuels are

- intertwined with long-term processes of development, alobalization, and urbanization.
- Climate change impacts are highly unequal but affect everyone. Chapters 7 and 8 demonstrate that climate change is having profound yet highly uneven impacts on individuals, households, communities, nations, and cultures, as well as on other species and ecosystems.
- Adaptation to climate change is necessary but insufficient.
   Chapter 9 turns to responses to climate change, focusing on adaptation.
- Transformations to sustainability are possible and underway.
   Chapter 10 emphasizes that the future people experience will, to a large extent, depend on human choices, decisions, and actions.

Many questions remain about whether and how society can make the profound changes needed to avoid dangerous climate change, especially when it remains an abstract or irrelevant issue to many people, when other concerns are considered priorities, and when people with vested interests and power are committed to the status quo, regardless of the implications for others, including future generations. As Leichenko and O'Brien emphasize throughout Climate and Society, climate change is a global challenge that requires acknowledging the diverse ways that change is understood and addressed. Meeting the challenge of climate change can open new opportunities and possibilities for a better world.

**Illustrations.** The bookmarks and coloring pages in each chapter helps readers connect with God's Word as they spend time coloring and meditating on each verse. Globalization. Homelessness. Ecological and economic crisis. Conflicts over sexuality. Violence. Romans Disarmed helps readers enter the world of ancient Rome and see how Paul's most radical letter transforms the lives of the marginalized then and now. Intentionally avoiding abstract debates about Paul's theology, Keesmaat and Walsh move back and forth between the present and the past as they explore themes of home, economic justice, creation care, the violence of

the state, sexuality, and Indigenous reconciliation. They show how Romans engages with the lived reality of those who suffer from injustice, both in the first century and in the midst of today's imperial realities.

According to Keesmaat and Walsh in Romans Disarmed, as those who have read their previous book, Colossians Remixed, will know, they seek to ground their reading of Paul in the minutiae of daily life, both in the first century and today. He explores historical influences on Angular Magic, including Pythagorean number mysticism, John Dee's Enochian magic, the theories of William Mortensen, and, most importantly, the writings of H. P. Lovecraft as well as other contributors to his Cthulhu mythos.

In <u>Infernal Geometry and the Left-Hand</u>

<u>Path</u> Chappell analyzes the 3 key rites of

Angular Magic: Die Elektrischen Vorspiele, the Ceremony of the Nine Angles, and the Call to Cthulhu, and expanding upon them. He examines the Nine Angles individually, detailing their keywords, powers, and related deities, and explains how each can be used in magical practices and as part of an ongoing initiatory process. He offers practical examples, including use of Angular Magic in divination, sigils, and magical symbols, and guidance on creating their own practices – a core component of the ever-evolving Left-Hand Path.

#### Chapters in <u>Infernal Geometry and the</u> <u>Left-Hand Path</u> include:

Chapter 1 is an overview of the Nine Angles as a magical system, including further background about its conception in The Ceremony of the Nine Angles.

Chapters 2 and 3 explore the historical antecedents of the Nine Angles and the development of the system within the Church of Satan and Temple of Set.

Chapter 4 covers various geometric concepts that are the basis for understanding the symbolism of the Nine Angles.

Chapter 5 discusses the semiotic theory of magic, placing it in the context of historical theories of magic as well as delving into the 'Command to Look' of photographer William Mortensen, which was a primary influence on Anton LaVey's Law of the Trapezoid.

Chapter 6 draws on the historical, geometrical, and theoretical material presented in the previous chapters to analyze in detail Die Elektrischen Vorspiele, The Ceremony of the Nine Angles, and The Call to Cthulhu. These three rituals are the foundational works of angular magic, and are critical to understand and study for their inspiration in crafting readers' own rituals.

Chapter 7 establishes the foundations for magical work with the Nine Angles. This groundwork includes suggestions for preparing and dedicating a chamber to the practice of angular magic, as well as the basis for daily practices that will awaken readers to the possibilities within this system.

Chapter 8 presents a variety of examples of illustrative and operative uses of the Angles. The illustrative operations – that is, the introspective and reflective applications of the Angles – explore such topics as a uniquely Left-Hand Path form of divination, sigils and symbols, and developing mindfulness. The operative applications focus on the use of the Angles to facilitate discernible change within the Self or in the objective universe.

Path concludes with the appendices that provide deeper historical context about angular magic through some of the rituals and essays that have been profound influences on its development within the Order of the Trapezoid.

Success is about focus: readers need to know what their aim is and how they intend to achieve it. Therefore, contained in <u>Training to Win</u> are many exercises used by World Champions to grassroots sailors which have been shown to be successful, but more than just the 'how', he has included the 'why' because when everyone clearly understands the aims and objectives, both motivation and understanding are improved.

Documenting the best way to train is so important, not just for sailing federations and training schools, but also for all sailors. This is true not only for those coming through the youth programs, but also for the adult sailors – it is never too late to teach an old dog new tricks.

Each and every one can improve their racing performance through good training.

There are a number of exercises for each area because different exercises achieve different objectives. It also helps to have variety. Some of the exercises in <u>Iraining to Win</u> are ones which can be done by one boat on its own, many can be done by groups of boats without a coach or coach boat, while some need a coach.

The majority of coach-run exercises should feel `race-like' because this means that, when sailors experience something similar in a race, they recognize that they have been in the situation before and feel more comfortable, whether it be having to do a sudden tack, reversing out of a situation or whatever.

Another benefit of a more race-like situation is that the sailors will be more motivated. This motivation is highlighted if the coach says they are recording the race results. Even if there are no prizes (or penalties... e.g. last place cooks the dinner), it inspires sailors to do their best. It is certainly worth having the more race-like exercises towards the end of a session, when the motivation may be on the decline.

<u>Training to Win</u> is written for sailors and coaches to get the most out of their training. It enables coaches to deliver better, more focused, training sessions, but it also helps sailors who don't have the benefit of a coach to practice and improve their sailing skills. Through using

the tools included in the book, readers and their trainees can have better sailing seasons and have a better chance of achieving their desired goals.
